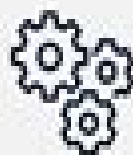

is important for us to reconsider our eating styles and develop new and sustainable food systems. This is particularly crucial since we are facing the risk of morbidity and mortality result from unhealthy diets. In 2019 the EAT Lancet commission offered a new food standard that gratifies both health and environmental sustainability calling it the planetary health diet. It is necessary for us to understand the sensory characteristics of the planetary health diet and how we humans select, consume and develop foods and beverages to satisfy the standards of this new dietary approach. These understandings add more fuel to promote the achievements of Sustainable Development Goals and of the planetary health diet. This Research Topic aims to reveal the neural and biological mechanisms underlying the perception and selection of the planetary health diet. Currently we have only little knowledge about taste and flavor perception so we do not know what sensory characteristics of foods are liked. Also we do not know the mechanisms involved in selecting certain foods. For example we know that excessive salt intake induces hypertension and or obesity but often we do not select low salt foods even when suffering from the high blood pressure. We also know that animal models e.g. mice, rats consume more of diets that impart a good taste for them. As humans however we do not always eat so much of foods that may taste good for us and may consume foods or beverages that are not so enjoyable for us.
